LVP 10th Anniversary

Henry Ford once said, “Coming together is a beginning. Keeping together is progress. Working together is success.” We are celebrating the success of our 10th year of the Lehigh Valley Professionals (LVP) because we believe in this same principle.

Coming together: After September 11, a small group of dislocated workers came together and met at the Pennsylvania CareerLink Lehigh Valley (PA CareerLink LV). We were acclimating to the post 911 event, but the after-shock of the new unemployment trend was also our new reality. We have realized that our expertise (executive, professional, clerical, manual labor, ..), level of education, and years of experience do not guarantee a sustainable career. We also identified that networking and peer support are key factors to help each other getting back on track. We then formed the Lehigh Valley Professionals Peer Networking Group (LVPPNG), which later renamed to Lehigh Valley Professionals (LVP). Our mission was, and still to this day, is to foster a professional forum where professionals can meet in a welcoming environment to network and find employment. In 2002, with the help from the PA CareerLink LV, we established our “home-base” at 1601 Union Boulevard in Allentown, PA.

Keeping together: Only about nineteen professionals attended our first meeting. However, as word got around, that number grew steadily every week. Our headcount ballooned as we worked with Karen McAndrew-Bush and Ray Spencer to introduce speakers at our meetings. In order to accommodate the packed meeting room, our Friday weekly meeting was then moved to the larger Lehigh Valley room. With over two thousand+ members, we beef up our LVP infrastructure by adding the needed committees, chairs, co-chairs and committee members. We also created the LVP Alumni group to foster networking and establish a “feedback” loop to the LVP group. In addition, we created a website to manage our content and to market our database of resumes to potential employers. We were involved with job fairs, focus groups, and industrial networking. Even though our numbers have grown significantly, we managed to stick together and support each other in times of need.

Working together: The success of LVP is due to the support from members like you, our partnership with the PA CareerLink LV, and the support from our community. We have numerous fantastic speakers who have volunteered their time and effort from the community. Their topics have covered networking, finance, unemployment compensation, Work Investment Act (WIA) and other job support tools, motivation, and much more. They understand what it’s like to be in your shoes and how to help you to get back on track. We also have the support from the PA CareerLink LV. Besides providing the facility for our meetings, they are a key link that bridges LVP with the business community. One of PA CareerLink LV’s employees, Karen McAndrew-Bush, has volunteered her time since the get-go to help keep LVP organized through all these years. Lastly, it’s the members like you, who believe in the values of LVP and help others with their job search. Some of you even stepped up to the plate and joined the LVP Executive Committee, who manages the operations of LVP.

Being displaced can be scary, but job hunting as a lone wolf is daunting. LVP is a free professional forum where professionals can meet in a welcoming environment to network and find employment. As a pack, we can be more successful. Job hunting is not easy. As Henry Ford also stated, “When everything seems to be going against you, remember that the airplane takes off against the wind, not with it.” I wish everyone the best with their job hunt and career.
